CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL COUNCIL

Dear partner in Mission,

nce again, we celebrate the birth of Jesus. In a manger in Bethlehem, amidst the animals and with Joseph by her side, Mary gave birth to the Son of God. What flowed through their hearts that night? Certainly tenderness and love, awe and wonderment: Who would this infant become?

Jesus grew in wisdom. He became a healer and teacher. He loved everyone, embracing the humble and the poor, and challenging the proud. He loved nature, speaking of lilies and birds and mustard seeds. He loved humanity so much that he underwent suffering and death on a cross, trusting completely in God who raised him to new life.

After much prayer and consideration, we have decided to begin a process to sell our property at 2685 Kingston Road and join other Roman Catholic religious communities in the building of a residence for our senior members, to be completed in 2018. three magazine issues (including the calendar issue) and one four-page bulletin (September-October 2016). In 2017 and 2018, the magazine format will gradually evolve into a four-page bulletin format only. The last issue of the magazine will be a special anniversary issue to commemorate the centennial of Scarboro Missions on November 9, 2018.

We continue to support our mission activities overseas through grants to people in need, through bursaries to missionaries from other mission societies for ongoing study, and to our Scarboro missionaries serving in Guyana and China. In Canada, we continue the vital ministries of the Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation Office, the Interfaith Department, the Mission Centre, the magazine, and the website. Thank you for your continued support and prayers as we journey into the future while faithfully serving the mission of Jesus Christ.

Caring for Creation: A New Educational Ministry

Pope Francis in his encyclical, Laudato Si, On Care for Our Common Home. reminds us that the Earth is our common home. He calls us to address the environmental problems facing our world by seeking justice that hears "both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor." In the fall 2015, Scarboro Missions launched its new Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation Office Education Program. Financial report 2014




The annual audit of our financial records for 2014 was completed L in the spring, and the audited financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors in June 2015 and filed with Canada Revenue Agency. Once again, this is a time to give thanks to God for the blessings we have received and to extend our gratitude to all of you for your continued support and generosity. We share with you our stewardship of your gifts in a summary of our 2014 revenue and expenditures.

Revenue sources

Our revenue in 2014 totalled \$3,622,909 as shown in the top graph. This included income from donations, bequests, fundraising, annuities, and other income, as well as \$500,000 that we used from our investment funds to help cover various unforeseen expenses during the course of the year. The areas of revenue are outlined as follows:

Under Basic Charity, in the amount of \$2,430,130 (67% of revenues), we included general gift donations of \$468,241 from our generous benefactors and \$250,458 from annual diocesan collections. We remain very grateful as well to people who have remembered Scarboro Missions in their Will. In 2014, income from bequests totaled \$1,597,079, representing 66% of the income reported under Basic Charity. We also received \$109,664 in donations designated for specific projects or for the particular work of missioners overseas, and \$1,480 designated for the care of senior missionary priests. Basic Charity also included \$3,208 in annual mission cooperative income and interfaith work.

The category of Direct Fundraising totaled \$81,780 in 2014 (2% of revenues) and included \$32,865 from Perpetual Mass enrollments; \$35,320 from the sale of our calendars, spiritual greeting cards, and posters; as well as \$13,595 generated from subscriptions to our magazine.

Other Income of \$329,407 (9% of revenues) included \$230,330 from the operation of our Mission Centre, which welcomes many guests each year. In 2014 more than half of the bookings were from Catholic groups, parishes, and religious orders. Mission Centre guests also include support groups, as well as groups from other Christian denominations and faith traditions, reflecting our commitment to ecumenical and interfaith outreach. The Centre also provides facilitation for as many as 5,000 high school students on retreat each year, both at our Centre and at other locations.

The category Other Income also included \$58,917 from chaplaincy work carried out by many of our priests, and \$40,160 from other miscellaneous income sources.

Our gift annuity program continues to provide a worthwhile means for our benefactors to invest in charitable annuities that generate regular income payments for life while also contributing to our mission work. Revenue from annuities totaled \$281,592 (8% of revenues).

Expenditures

Our total expenditures in 2014 amounted to \$3,147,940. A total of \$521,808 was disbursed to support mission work overseas, representing 17% of total expenses. This figure has decreased over recent years because we have closed several overseas missions. We also have many priests who have retired due to age or illness, and a large number of lay missioners who served with us faithfully for many years have now returned to Canada. Expenditures for overseas mission work in 2014 included \$165,894 for living expenses for our missioners and costs for their various ministries, as well as \$109,664 designated by benefactors for missioners' special projects. The General Council also approved grants totaling \$176,400 for other overseas mission work and \$69,850 was disbursed for the ongoing formation of priests from other missionary communities.

Since the time of our founding in 1918, the Church's understanding of mission has changed significantly.

Mission still means crossing boundaries to reach out to people of other cultures and faiths, serving in creative and new endeavours to witness Christ's love for all peoples. Today our mission is not only overseas but also in Canada, particularly as people from other lands continue to come here to live. It is important that we be witnesses of Christ, reaching out to people of other cultures and faiths within this country and entering into dialogue with them. As a result, more of our resources are being used for mission work in Canada.

In 2014, Canadian ministries represented 22% of total expenditures, or \$686,845. This work included promoting interreligious dialogue (\$133,594); justice, peace and integrity of creation initiatives (\$39,817); the production of our magazine and other communications materials (\$174,467); and the work of our Mission Centre (\$338,967). As part of our ministry work in Canada, we offer studies in Scripture and Catholic Social Teaching and in 2014 there were a series of lectures on Scripture and on "The Joy of the Gospel" by Pope Francis. 





sessions are well attended and provide the opportunity for some of our priests and outside lecturers to support adult religious education and spirituality.

The General Council in 2014 also approved donations to other Canadian charities to support designated mission work totaling \$107,614 (3% of expenditures).

In 2014 Support Ministries included various areas of administration totaling \$613,268 or 19% of expenditures. Expenses in this category included \$72,810 for the training of a seminarian studying to be a priest for Scarboro

Missions, and other ongoing education and renewal programs for our priests. The largest item in Support Ministries was the cost of the office of the General Council and the Treasurer's Office, amounting to \$423,741. Also included in Support Ministries was the cost of recruitment, formation, and placement for Scarboro Mission's One-Year Lay Mission Program, totaling \$116,717 in 2014. This program is a way of introducing young adults to mission and crosscultural experience and includes placements in Guyana. The individuals work with other long-term lay missioners to

help make meaningful contributions in the communities where they live and work.

The central house at 2685 Kingston Road serves as the base for most of our activities in Canada. Costs to support the operation of the central house in 2014 amounted to \$410,307 (13% of total expenditures). Scarboro missioners in leadership and administration live and work here. It also serves as a residence for our senior members and we welcome many visitors each year. In 2014, central house expenses amounted to \$186,822, and in addition, maintenance and operating costs for the building totaled \$223,485.

The expenditure category of Sick and Retired includes the cost of medical needs and support for our infirm and retired members who have served faithfully for many years overseas, as well as funeral expenses at the time of death. We are an aging community and therefore the care of our senior members in Canada represents a significant portion of our ongoing expenditures (14% in 2014), totaling \$443,684.

Contractual Obligations totaled \$298,809 (9% of total expenditures) in 2014. This category includes annuity expenses of \$134,691, as well as pension payments of \$73,320 for former


